


LAY ECCLESIAL MINISTRY INSTITUTE


- The Lay Ecclesial Ministry Institute (LEMI) is a four-year comprehensive ministry formation program for lay leaders in the Diocese of Richmond.
- To apply, candidates must be actively ministering in a catechetical-related role in the diocese for a minimum of one year. Roles include: **Directors/Coordinators of Religious Education, Youth Ministers, RCIA/Adult Faith Formation Coordinators, Campus Ministers, and Catholic School Religion Teachers.**
- Each applicant undergoes a psychological evaluation by a licensed professional.
- Two academic tracts with tuition subsidized by Annual Diocesan Appeal for Lay Development:
 - **LEMI-Traditional:** Candidate earns a Master's degree in Theology from a regionally accredited Catholic University. LEMI offers a \$680 tuition subsidy per graduate class.
 - **LEMI-Certificate:** Candidate earns a Certificate of Study with Continuing Education Units from University of Dayton.



“The four areas of formation—human, spiritual, intellectual, and pastoral – that provide a framework for the formation of deacons and priests provide a framework for lay ecclesial ministers as well.” (*Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord*, p. 34.)

- LEMI candidates are required to attend 40 LEMI workshop hours in human and pastoral formation to enhance ministry skills and help them build wholesome, healthy relationships with those to whom they minister.
- Candidates are encouraged to work with a Spiritual Director and are required to attend four annual overnight LEMI retreats to help them develop a deeper spirituality.
- Since 2010, lay ministers from 55 parishes have taken advantage of LEMI. Over the last four years, 42 candidates have been commissioned as Lay Ecclesial Ministers for the Diocese of Richmond. Thirty-two candidates are currently in formation and are expected to be commissioned over the next few years.
- Upon commissioning, candidate receives a \$1,000 financial award from the diocese. In addition, those employed by the diocese are eligible to receive a promotion in pay grade.

LEMI is guided by *National Certification Standards for Lay Ecclesial Ministers* and the United States Catholic Conference of Bishops (USCCB) document *Co-Workers in the Vineyard of the Lord: A Resource for Guiding the Development of Lay Ecclesial Ministry*. “Just as the diocesan bishop oversees the preparation of priests and deacons of the diocese, he is rightly attentive to the proper preparation of the growing number of lay women and men who minister in the Church.” (*Co-Workers*, p. 55)
